The book exchange was a success and we got to sing some of our favorite hymns from our hymnbook. Thank you, Jean L., for leading us in singing. Since we have all been invited to Jim and Laura W's beach house in June, the June Quaker Study Program has been moved to July 20. If this conflicts with movie night, we can change that to July 13. Anyone interested in expanding his or her knowledge of Quakerism is invited to attend a class that meets on the second Sundays of the month at 9:15 a.m. In June we will meet on June 10 and talk about the Universality of the Light, the Role of Reason and "The Place of Universalism in the Religious Society of Friends." The latter is a pamphlet that costs \$3. See me if you need one. The other resource is Howard Brinton's *Friends for 300 (or 350) Years* (pages 35-39 in 300).

Questions for reflection and discussion are: Why should Friends be careful in their use of reason? How is the Light universal? Do you see problems in Friends' heavy use of the term Light? What dangers of racism and sexism lie in the equation of "light" with goodness and "darkness" with evil? What are the limits of the metaphor of the Light? How is the Friends concept of the Light universalist? How is it Christian? How do you respond to the Quaker universalism expressed by Dan Seeger (page 90)? Why does he say, "Genuine universalism is very demanding of its practitioners?" Do you agree? (Connie R.)

**Nonviolent Communications:** Everyone is invited to the Nonviolent Communication (NVC) study and practice group, which will meet every other Wednesday at the meetinghouse from 7:00 to 8:30 p.m. on May 23, June 6 and 20, and August 1, 15, and 29. We will use Marshall Rosenberg's book, *Nonviolent Communication*, a Language of Life, which is available at Barnes and Noble, Amazon.com, and The Center for Nonviolent Communication, www.cnvc.org.

**About Nonviolent Communication:** NVC was developed by Marshall Rosenberg in response to the violence he observed in the streets of his Detroit neighborhood when he was growing up. Nonviolence does not refer only to the absence of physical harm, but also to a way of "walking gently over the Earth, responding to that of God in everyone." It is a model of communication based on empathy and honesty that helps us connect with ourselves and others with greater compassion.

Some underlying assumptions of NVC are that all human beings share the same feelings and needs, that all actions are attempts to meet needs, that all human beings have the capacity for compassion, that human beings enjoy giving, and that human beings meet needs through relationships. NVC gives us tools for connecting and caring for everyone's needs. The aim is to work toward solutions that meet everyone's needs, not just our own, and not just the other person's. It can help us reach a "sense of the Meeting" with anyone. "It is a practice rooted in understanding, in living honestly, and in acting empathically with all beings." (www.cnvc.org)

Since Marshall Rosenberg began trainings in the 1960's, NVC has become an international movement and is used by individuals in personal relationships, in mediation, in prison work, and in international negotiations. Marshall Rosenberg may not be a Quaker, but he gives Quakers (and others) a strategy for more fully embracing our testimonies of simplicity, peace, integrity, community, and equality. (*Jeannie B*)

And Then to Rivers and Tides at Movie Night: This month's Movie Night feature is the documentary *Rivers and Tides* (aka *Andy Goldsworthy: Rivers and Tides: Working with Time* Gather with your popcorn at the Burton's at 7 p.m. Friday, June 15. On the surface, this Thomas Riedelsheimer's documentary film, which won numerous prizes, is "about" Scottish artist Andy Goldsworthy, whose art centers around ephemeral sculptures created in nature. New York Times critic Stephen Holden writes about this movie: "As the film's images accumulate, the movie becomes a sustained and ultimately refreshing meditation on surrender to the idea of temporality. If Mr. Goldsworthy's humility in the face of change reminds us that all is vanity, his playfulness also reminds us that a fervent engagement in the moment is in its own way infinite." The ideas that Mr. Goldsworthy passionately believes about art and creation are relevant to all who create, no matter what medium they use. While the movie is certainly "appropriate" for children, it may well be too slow-moving for the younger set. (*Arlene E. and Catherine P.*)

**Around the Meetinghouse:** In the spring, Jeannie B. and I saw the hog plum (*Prunus umbrellata*) just south of the front retention pond blooming. This week I noticed that it has small plums on it. Yesterday Bill handed me two blueberries from one of the native *Vaccinium darrowii* planted behind the split rail fence - they were small, flavorful, and reminded me of some blueberries I had picked with my cousins in a sandy area of Maine and made into blueberry pie.

I have been enjoying the creamy white magnolia blossoms, both on the *Magnolia grandiflora* and on the sweet bay magnolia. They are showy blooms, but there are small rewards also, like the lovely blue globes of the eryngo (*Eryngium baldwinii or Erygium prostratum*), a creeping plant volunteering in the front retention basin. I was delighted when Karen A. pointed out a passion vine growing in the front retention basin, since this vine is a host plant for the Florida state butterfly, the zebra longwing.

We have a number of larval host plants on the property. The saw palmetto hosts monk skippers, oaks host dusky wing skippers and white-M hairstreaks, sweet bay magnolia hosts tiger swallowtails, the frog fruit creeping in our grass hosts common buckeyes and phaon crescents, coontie hosts Florida atalas, Spanish needles hosts dainty sulphurs, pepper grass hosts great southern whites and checkered whites, hackberry trees host hackberry butterflies, and the American elm hosts the snout butterflies, question marks, and tawny emperors.

We have some nectar plants as well, including ironweed (*Vernonia gigantea*) and Stoke's aster (planted by Karen A.), tread softly volunteering in some of our parking bays and other places, fire bush resprouting after dying back in the winter in the front garden and in the educational garden, phlox and lyre leaf sage in the front retention basin, and tropical sage (native) returning to the front garden (where it was planted by Karen A.), sparkleberries, and most recently, the wild ageratum (*Conoclinium coelestinium*) planted by the children. It would be nice to have some butterfly weed (*Asclepias tuberose*). (*Jean L.*)
