Queries for the Twelfth Month: PEACE TESTIMONY AND NON-VIOLENCE

Do we seek consistently to carry out this testimony for peace in all our relationships, including family, community, and work life? Do we as an individual and as members of Meeting seek to take part in the ministry of reconciliation between individuals, groups and nations? Do we faithfully maintain our peace testimony? Do we reject military training, preparation for war, and participation in war as inconsistent with the spirit of Christ's teachings? Do we as a Meeting take a stand and do all we can to remove the causes of war and violence?

Advice: War is contrary to the life and teaching of Jesus. Seek through God's power and grace to overcome in our hearts the emotions that lie at the root of conflict. Strive for non-violent approaches to conflicts in all aspects of our lives. Every human being is a beloved child of God, and has that Divine spark which claims our reverence. War is a denial of this truth. Friends' peace testimony is the positive exercise of good will calling us to lend our influence to all that strengthens the growth of international friendships and understanding. Cultivate an active spirit of love and peace.
