Around the Meetinghouse Jean Larson & April 19, 2009

Today we held meeting for worship outdoors in a space near the end of the driveway where Bud Brennan had cleared the underbrush. On the walk out, we passed the mock orange (Philadelphus inodorata) blooming happily along the split rail fence. This shrub likes the alkaline soil in that area. If you know where to look, you will find shoots of passion vine (Passiflora incarnata) appearing not far from the mock orange. Last year this plant hosted Zebra Longwing and Gulf Fritillary caterpillars.

A four person team (Bill, Brian, Dick and Jim P) took two trips to move the two benches from the place where previously we held meetings for worship in nature to the new area. Several people brought outdoor chairs from home to sit on. These together with some chairs from the social room meant that all who came had a place to sit. David reminded us of our first meeting for worship on the property sitting not far from this location on tree stumps cut by Bud. The new location has the virtue of being drier than the old location, and unlike that location,

is out of the usual path of storm water through the property. It was wonderful to feel the breeze and to hear the bird songs and other sounds of nature.

I was sick during the native plant sale this month, so only bought a few handfuls of flowers which Bill and I planted on Saturday, during the meeting workday. We



weeded together companionably, clearing weeds from the area by our new sign, and noting the reappearance of the dune sunflowers. We pulled lots



of hop clover from the bed at the entrance to the parking lot. It has been enriching the soil, and now we added some more red salvia that the butterflies liked so much last year. The native butterfly weed (Asclepias tuberosa) and blanket flowers (Gaillardia grandiflora) are coming up as well, so there will be a mix of flowers in the area. Near the old stump, we planted twin flowers (Dyschoriste oblongifolia), a low growing lavender flower. We planted two clumps of Muhly grass and two Conradinas in the

children's yard. It is lovely to see the new goldenrod plants (Solidago stricta) growing vigorously by the fence, and to see all the slender trumpet shape flowers on the coral vine. Some of the yellow butterfly milkweed (Asclepias curassavica) is growing up again along the fence behind the meetinghouse. It was very popular with the monarch butterflies last year.

The iris having been growing happily in the front retention basin, but somehow we have some yellow iris, which are non-native and possibly invasive. They are not on the Florida list, so they will probably stay unless they show signs of trying to crowd out the native blue ones.



I have been enjoying the Earthcare Witness vegetable gar den planted by the children in the sunny spot below the stairs to the social room door. Next time you come by, take a look at the way the plants are growing in their special box.
