It is October now, and we have been having warm days with not so much rain. The greeneyes (Berlandiera subacaulis) and false pennyroyal (Philblephis rigida)I purchased at the Fall Native Plant Sale are comfortable in the flower bed by the driveway as you entering the parking lot. The bed is ready for renewal, and these few plants are a token in that direction. The nearby firebush, planted by Tracy Jeshow, is still blooming, as are some of the salvias.

In the children's yard, a dotted horsemint is showing white and pink streaked leaves. Behind the meetinghouse, the cassia looks ready to bloom and seems to wish it would rain more. The yellow tropical butterfly weed (Asclepias curassavica) still has a few blooms on it. The pine needles are falling now and piling up on the lawn and surely in the gutters as well.

I walked in the woods and checked on the status of the dead Chinese tallow. There are sprinkles of sawdust drifting down the trunk, signs that bugs are making their homes there are beginning the natural process of recyling.

A small vegetable garden has been planted in boxes under the windows of the children's room. The meeting was delighted to hear from the children and sing the "Inch by inch" song celebrating gardening.
