The Quaker Way of Discussing Business

- ❖ Are we prepared to let go of our individual desires and let the Holy Spirit lead us to unity?
- ❖ Do we recognize that the search for unity may require us to accept with good grace a decision of the Meeting with which we are not entirely in agreement?
- ❖ Proceed in the peaceable spirit of the light of Truth, with forbearance and warm affection for each other. Be willing to wait upon God as long as may be necessary for the emergence of a decision which clearly recommends itself as the right one.
- ❖ Feel free to express views, but refrain from pressing them unduly. Guard against contentiousness, obstinacy and love of power. Admit the possibility of being in error. In Meetings for Business, and in all duties connected with them, seek the leadings of the Light.
- ❖ Be aware that excessively long offerings, where one outruns a leading, unnecessarily consumes the time of many.
- Try to speak once to an issue. If a Friend has "spoken your mind", simply note this. At the time the Clerk places an issue before the Meeting, you will then have an opportunity to voice your "I approve".

Freedom Riders/Freedom Walkers: Jean Larson brought us a calendar from Berkeley Meeting that has short Quaker stories. As we commemorate the 50th anniversary of the Freedom Rides, here is another story to remember:

On Wednesday, May 16, 1838, just two days after the new, abolitionist built Pennsylvania Hall had been dedicated, the second Anti-Slavery Convention of American Women, organized by **Lucretia Mott**, met there.

Bricks and rocks were thrown through the windows. Lucretia had each black woman walk out arm in arm with a white woman. They were met with insults and more rocks.

The next day the keys to the building were publically turned over to the mayor under a promise of protection. Once he left, a crowd of 12–15 thousand broke in, destroyed everything and set the building on fire. (no citation for crowd estimate given) "On to Mott's house," the crowd cried. A quick-thinking friend, pretending to be part of the mob, led them in the wrong direction.

As we remember one set of brave, determined people, let us also be mindful of others who were injured and humiliated working for freedom.

After an absence of around six weeks, Bill and I returned to Gainesville. On my first visit to the meeting property on May 10 to

gather some rosemary for roast chicken, Bud pointed out that the passionflower (Passiflora incarnata) near the meeting for worship room had sprouted from many places and was flowering. Later Gary moved the vine so it would climb the



cherry laurels nearby in its search for the sun.

I admired the planting of the slope in front of the meetinghouse which is being watered by a system of soaker hoses on a timer set up by Bud. At the top around the peace pole is Georgia calamint (*Georgia calamintha*), which is a mint native to the eastern panhandle of Florida. Along the top of the slope is rose mock vervain (*Glandularia canadensis*) in the widely available cultivar Homestead purple. Rose mock vervain is native to Alachua County. Tucked into spaces between and below the rocks are blue-eyed grass (*Sisyrinchium augustifolia* or *Sisyrinchium xerophyllum*) and below are powderpuff (*Mimosa strigliossa*), a low growing plant with pink puffs of flowers, both native to Alachua County. They are both in the iris family, the first is widely

available and usually occurring in wetlands, while the second is not widely available and is native to well-drained sandy uplands.

On May 14, Bill and I spotted a snapping turtle in the first pool of water we came across as we walked up the dry creek bed. Very likely she was traveling through looking for a good place to lay eggs.

That evening it rained a much welcome rain (I had watered the wilting tropical salvia, royal fern, red anise, mock orange earlier in the week), and on our after meeting walk the next day, the creek was flowing.



The dead Chinese tallow at the top of the drainage ditch has finally toppled, probably nudged by the wind and rushing water of the storm after a substantial dry spell. Downstream only three of the river oats also known as Indian wood oats (*Chasmanthium latifolia*) still survive.



dune sunflower, rose mock vervain. We counted petals and sepals, pulled apart the petunia blossom to see the pistil and stamens in the tube formed by the fused petals, noticed the similarities between the petunia and the tomato flower.

I joined the children in first day school on May 15. Malakai, Addie, Ella, Sandy and I picked some of flowers: a petunia, squash blossom, tomato flower and marigold from the vegetable garden; a purple cone flower, cluster of elderberry flowers, blanket flower,

observed the sepals are still present on the tomato, pepper and eggplant, and saw similar structures inside when we cut a cross-section through these vegetables (technically these are fruit). Sandy pulled up a potato plant with medium/small redskin potatoes. The petunia, eggplant, tomato and potato are all in the solanaceae family, whose flowers typically have 5 sepals, 5 fused petals, 5 stamens and a pistil with 2 chambers. I enjoyed my time in first day school and encourage you to think about spending 15 minutes or an hour sharing something special to you with our young folks.

Other flowers blooming this month include Stokes aster (Stokesia laevis) native to scattered panhandle and northeast Florida counties,

palmetto in woods, coral honeysuckle on the fence in the children's yard, and coreopsis along the ramp up in front of the meetinghouse. I have started to weed the newly planted slope in front of the meetinghouse to keep it tidy and welcoming to the new plants we have put in.

From our Outgoing Clerk ... Our meeting has been struggling with issues around how we do business and difficulties with our monthly business meetings, our Meeting for Worship with a Concern for Business. After heartfelt searching, our Clerk Mona Morris felt that Friends wanted more understanding about Quaker guidelines and beliefs with regard to business meeting. There were and are a variety of understandings and levels of experience with Meeting for Worship with a Concern for Business and Quaker business practices. Especially, how to arrive at decisions in a caring connected way. Out of that concern, our Clerk sent our Ministry & Nurture Committee a request to consider a meeting retreat and they did schedule one, with Phoebe Andersen of Tallahassee meeting, on May 7th to consider these topics. It was a well attended and many excellent ideas came out of that gathering.

In the retreat, helpful ways to make our business meetings (or Meeting for Worship with a Concern for Business) more worshipful, more orderly, more enjoyable and less tedious were explored. Understanding how our Meeting committees work, what and when business is brought to the Meeting as a whole and bringing things to business meeting after careful discernment was discussed. Also explored was good use of time and keeping meetings from becoming tedious. The Retreat ended by Phoebe encouraging us to consider making some changes to achieve both Worship and Business while staying in unity with the Spirit. Very practical suggestions and clear guidelines were shared.

The forum on June 5th will be reviewing and responding to points to consider and possibly thinking about changes we could make to strengthen our business process.
