QUERIES for The Seventh Month: SELF DISCIPLINE AND RESPONSIBILITY

<u>Query</u>: Do we attend Meeting for Worship regularly and punctually? Do we participate in Meeting for Worship with a Concern for Business and support it financially and with personal service according to our resources and abilities? Are we conscientious in fulfilling all obligations of state and society that are not contrary to our religious convictions? Are we punctual in keeping promises, just in payment of debts, and honorable in all our dealings? Do we choose recreations that strengthen our physical, mental and spiritual life, avoiding those that may hinder others, our Earth, and ourselves? Do we act responsibly concerning substances and behaviors that can become addictive?

<u>Advice</u>: Take heed, dear Friends, to the promptings of love and truth in our hearts, which are the leadings of God. Bring the whole of our life under the healing and ordering of the Holy Spirit, remembering that there is no time but this present. When tempted to do wrong or to despair, call upon God with an open heart, confessing our weaknesses and our needs. Be mindful at all times of our connection with the Divine and others – avoid substances, behaviors and activities which diminish this connection. Be aware of the ill effects of mind-altering or habit-forming drugs, intoxicants, gambling, and other detrimental practices. Around the Meetinghouse



After a long dry spell rain has come, with the first big thunderstorm dumping around three inches of rain. That storm put enough water in the retention ponds to be seen the next day and to put the roots of the royal fern (Osmunda regalis), at the back of the front retention pond, under water. The lawn, the wax myrtles, the flowers (and the weeds) are growing vigorously with the welcome showers.

The live oaks between the front retention pond and the pond area are putting out fresh growth now that Phil with help from Bill cut down a number of sweet gum trees that were piercing the canopy of the live oaks. Some of this cut wood is piled out by the side of the road until we decide how to deal with it.

The ironweed (Vernonia) planted by Karen Arrington has been volunteering in a number of places in the garden and is coming up in the woods as well. She described it as liking to have its feet in the shade and its head in the sun, which it gets in the area with the sparkleberries where she planted it.

Bill bought some simple low wire fencing to enclose the area where the armadillo had been digging and disturbing the hibiscus plants. It has worked well and that little fence is hidden in the surrounding Bidens that the bees and butterflies like to visit. We put another such fence around one of the loblolly bays (Gordonia lasianthus) because the native ferns I planted around it were also receiving unwanted attention from the worm seeking armadillo. Since I have been watering these ferns, I noticed a St. Andrews Cross (Hypericum hypericoides) volunteering nearby in the back retention pond. It is a very small shrub at the moment with a tall stick marking its place. At one point the top of the stick became a landing spot for a jeweled dragonfly. The St. Andrews Cross in the front retention pond has just started flowering.

When we joined the Iranian cyclists in planting the chickasaw plum (Prunus augustifolia), the tree was covered with beautiful white blossoms. Now a few plums are ripening, so the tree seems happy where we planted it. On the other side of the path to the meeting for worship in nature area, I added some coonties near some native azaleas given by Annie McPherson. The flame azaleas put on a lovely show this past spring, and the coonties will show up in the winter when the azaleas lose their leaves.



The passion vine is throwing up more shoots by the split rail fence as some of the existing shoots lose their vigor. None of the caterpillars have grown to maturity, but the butterflies are still attracted to the plant. This morning, it put out another of its lovely, complex flowers.

Bill reports that the air potato vines are climbing up the trees. He regularly digs between seven and twelve pounds of the subterranean tubers each Saturday, usually working south of the pond or elsewhere along the south border. Sporadic shoots are coming up in the meeting for worship in nature area and randomly in some of the other well-traveled parts of the land.

The deer's tongue (Carphephorus) that Bart Hulett gave us last fall has been coming up vigorously in the children's yard and I recently noticed that one of the gay feather (Liatris) plants he gave us has sprouted as well. It had been hidden in plain sight near several goldenrods, and I only noticed it when I when to pull a few weeds. The seven sisters rose he gave us this spring has settled in along the fence not far from our other rose and has extended a shoot upwards which I take as a sign that it is getting comfortable where it is. The blanket flowers have continued to flower profusely both in the children's yard and in the garden near the Peace Pole. They are spilling out from the children's yard onto the ramp and into bike rack area. (*Jean Larson*)
