**Forum:** On Sunday, June 1 Cheryl Demers-Holton will present a forum on the topic of "Hospice Care." Cheryl has spent many years as a nurse for Hospice and is willing to share her considerable knowledge on end of life issues with us.

**Quakerism 101:** Everyone is welcome to attend the next session of Quakerism 101 on Sunday, June 8 at 9:15 a.m. even if you have not attended before. We will gather in the meetinghouse library and will continue our study of Friends' Testimonies. The reading for this session will be Margaret Hope Bacon's "Quaker Women as Abolitionists" from her book, <u>As The Way Opens</u>. Copies will be on the shelf on the bookcase under the clock in the foyer behind the social room door. Questions for reflection include: Why do you believe tense relationships existed between women abolitionists and the Religious Society of Friends as a whole? Are such tensions visible in the Society of Friends today? Where? With which testimonies do you most resonate? Are

**First-Day School Committee and First-Day School Events:** At a recent Firstday School Committee meeting we made the following plans. We welcome comments and suggestions. For the younger children we decided to have play, sharing and stories for June, July and August.

In September we will begin lessons from the FGC Dr. Seuss curriculum and also continue using lessons from the FGC Sparklers curriculum. We'll divide the younger children into two groups; the groupings will be fluid. The older ones will have the lessons and the younger ones will have play, sharing and stories.

For the teens/pre-teens, during the summer Catherine Puckett will set in motion plans for get-togethers, one of which we hope will include SEYM teens tubing down the Ichetucknee River. When they attend Meeting for Worship they can choose to stay in Meeting for Worship or hanging out with the younger children, or organize some activity (discussion, reading, worship sharing......) together.

Beginning in September we'll follow a schedule:

First Firstday - remain in Meeting for Worship

Second Firstday - a program/lesson suitable for them, including a unit on Bono

Third Firstday - Earthcare Witness

Fourth Firstday - work with the younger children;

Fifth Firstday - if there is one, is to be arranged. (Laura Winefordner)

#### Around the Meetinghouse:

The month has been rather dry, with one notable rain that the newspaper reported as leaving 0.2 inches of rainfall, so I or Bill in my place have gone out each day to water the transplanted wax myrtles. Bill has been trimming back the brown foliage and finally new leaves are appearing down low on some of the ones on which I was beginning to give up hope. Persistence pays.

Bill has continued going after exotic invasive plants. He reports that with the pond area dry enough to walk on, yet still not completely dry, he has been able to pull taro roots out more easily. One Saturday he removed two large buckets of taro roots. The air potato vines are sprouting. I found one on a walk through the property that I placed on the cement stairs to the social room with its sprout variously sprawled among the bars of the aluminum railing. Lots of people have noticed it has rudimentary leaves and has been continuing without water in the hot sun on the south facing side of the building. As I walked up the stairs one time, a lizard raced across the landing to perch on the air potato in a inconspicuous pose.

A creature, probably an armadillo according to Phil Buskirk, has been digging in the wet dirt and mulch around the wax myrtles, the plum tree, the olive tree and hibiscus I planted. The holes made are pointed and there are some lines in the dirt that appear to have been made by an armadillo tail. Phil says they armadillo's are attracted to wet places since they are looking for worms to eat. The little hibiscus plants have been dislodged multiple times and the birdsfoot violets buried by all this activity. I placed some wire fencing around the plum tree which has limited the digging to around the outside of the fence.



The largest of the green dragon plants has bright green berries on it. Since it is

along the path to the creek that starts at the end of the drive by the mulch pile, I go past it frequently and occasionally check the berries, hoping to see them turn red. The foliage on these plants of the bottomland forest is a lovely shape.

Since I am watering every day, I give a few squirts to the little Lobelia cardinalis (Cardinal flower) that has sprouted from the roots of last year's plants. It will be quite a while before these sprouts get big enough to flower, and I hope the rains come to provide the water they need.

We have passionvine growing in three areas: by the backdoor to the meeting for worship room, in the front retention pond and along the split rail fence. The latter location is growing most strongly and has had two flowers already. Last year the orange with black spike caterpillars of the gulf fritillary butterfly ate the leaves down to the stems. This year I have seen a pair of zebra longwings (the FL state butterfly) dancing near the plant but no gulf fritillaries. The passionvine is larval host to both these butterflies and there are a couple of very small black and white caterpillars that I think are from the zebra longwings.

The coral honeysuckle vine growing on the fence in the children's yard is thriving and blooming profusely. Bill planted two more purchased at the native plant sale, one on each side of the one that has done so well. We have added more yellow jessamine to the fence near the meeting for worship room, to replace what we lost.



Gary Arthur told me about the sale of plants grown by master gardeners, and I found the quality high and the prices low. Three native ferns were planted around a loblolly bay by the back retention pond, an oakleaf hydrangea was put in by the end of the split rail fence near the plum tree, five coreopsis in the children's yard, a cassia (yellow blooms in the fall, may fail to be native) north and west of the worship room. Thanks to Gary, we have two additional coral bean plants: one by the back retention pond and the other nearby on the border with Shir Shalom.

We are getting compliments on the wild flowers, especially the Gaillardia pulchella (Blanket flower) that has reseeded itself by the drive where we come in and in the children's yard. *(Jean Larson)*
