Quakerism 101: Everyone is invited to join our next discussion on Sunday, September 14 at 9:15 a.m. in the meetinghouse library. The topic is "Leadings." I have left what I could find on the topic on the top shelf of the bookcase in the foyer under the clock. If you take a pamphlet, please check it out in the library and remember to return it. The best source for this topic is Ruth Hyde-Payne's pamphlet, "How Do I Know It's a Leading?" If anyone has one, please share. Otherwise refer to George Fox's Journal to find examples of his leadings. Truth of the Heart pages 8 – 11 condenses George Fox's writings on the topic. I will try to have copies available and placed on the same shelf.

Questions for Reflection and Discussion: What has come to me in worship that I know to have been a leading from God, causing me to live out a testimony in the outer world? How am I held accountable for my witness? How do I know I have been faithful?

Quaker Study Program: Nancy Atkinson will lead us in exploring the concepts of mysticism and fundamentalism in the Abrahamic religions. Her text is <u>The Battle for God</u> by Karen Armstrong. We will meet in the meetinghouse on Friday, September 26 at 6 p.m. for a potluck supper and a presentation/discussion following.

Forum: Brian Blackmore has just returned from a 6 week course in Leadership for Young Adult Friends at Pendle Hill. He will present a forum on his experience on Sunday, September 21 at 1 p.m. Quaker Earthcare Witness Committee has graciously lent the meeting their time so that we can hear Brian at this early opportunity.

Friends Committee for Consultation passes on the information that the unprogrammed meeting in Louisville, Kentucky has received in attendance two extended refugee families from Burundi who have settled in the area. A third Burundian family is on its way. Evangelical Friends from Kansas began the first Friends Churches in Burundi more than 70 years ago. While worship in Louisville is much quieter than the Burundians are used to, the adults have taken to the unprogrammed worship. If you were to walk near the meetinghouse before or after worship, however, you might just hear the sounds of Kentucky Friends learning to sing in Kirundi and French.

Fun, Games, & Peace September 14, 2008

First Day School The elementary group, and any teens/pre-teens attending, will begin the Dr. Seuss curriculum on September 7th and 28th, with "To Think I Saw It on Mullberry Street." The activities promise to be interesting and fun.

Forum on Creativity & Spirituality October 5th John Westmark will give a presentation of his work and the relationship between creativity and spirituality. John holds a BFA from the Kansas City Art Institute and an MFA from the University of Florida.

Film Night: On Friday, September 19, instead of our traditional film night, we will have a special evening in "China." We will have (1) a few scenes from the opening and closing ceremonies of the Beijing Olympics, (2) a power-point presentation by our own Robert Roberg, who is just back from spending several weeks in China, and (3) part of Bill Moyers's interview with Phillip Pan, author of Out of Mao's Shadow. There will be an opportunity to ask Robert questions about his trip and to have some discussion after the film. The evening at the Friends Meeting House will begin at 7 pm.

Labor Day Forum: On Sunday, August 31, following our social hour, we will have a special Labor Day Forum, featuring Bill Moyers's 8/15/08 interview with Andrew Bacevich, author of The Limits of American Power: The End to American Exceptionalism. The discussion is very broad-ranging and covers how we have become more materialistic, consumer-oriented, reckless in our spending, and more deeply in debt—and how this has led us to become increasingly dependent on imports of energy, manufactured goods (because we have exported our jobs), and credit. This, in turn has made us more reliant on the misguided ineffective use of military power to try, unsuccessfully, to maintain our control in the world. This threatens our very liberty, democracy, and financial security, destroying both our working class and our middle class—in the end, an unsustainable situation. Come join us for an enlightening discussion!

Around the Meetinghouse

At the end of July, Karen Porter spotted a gopher tortoise on the property and showed it to Bill. It disappeared into the wax myrtles, which have come back nicely.

August started with a dry spell; I was out of town for a trip to Hawaii for a week and missed watering for two weeks. Some of the plants are still showing their distress and the Atlantic St. John's Worts (Hypericum reductum) that I planted near the coral beans have died. In Hawaii Bill and I saw lots of Wedelia (Wedelia trilobata) where it is a common exotic invasive. Since Bill and I had just found a patch on the meeting grounds, we were even more attuned to it. While there we visited one of the highest swamps in the world. It is a wonderful place.

After we returned, Fay came with lots of rain. Some of the shrubs have bent with the force of the rain. I walked out around the back retention pond during a lull in the rain and found an inch or two of standing water on sections of the grass. Being out during the gray light of the storm I saw a large frog by the outlet onto the drive of one of the gutters, his nose pointed toward the continuing flow of water coming out. Usually I am aware of all the frogs when I come out at night and can hear their choruses.

After talking with Andy Merritt, I started looking for any five-fingered footprints, probably of raccoons in the sandy areas near the creek. One afternoon Jeannie B and I were in the worship in nature area and saw a pair of downy woodpeckers investigating the trees there. I had never noticed this type of woodpecker before.

We have planted a variety of flowers with the idea of attracting butterflies and we have also been attracting a variety of bees. I saw a blue bee recently on the Ironweed (Vernonia gigantea) that Karen A planted and I have seen many butterflies there, including a skipper with its characteristic long tail. I had spotted some small caterpillars on the yellow butterfly milkweed that Gary grew for the Master Gardener sale before Fay came by and checked today to find they were much larger and were eating themselves out of a home. They have yellow and black stripes and are probably monarch caterpillars, which can only eat milkweed. The bees and butterflies are such a blessing.
