QUERIES for The Eighth Month: PERSONAL INTEGRITY AND RIGHT ACTION

Query: Do we keep to simplicity and moderation in speech, manner of living and vocation? Do we make time in our day for silence, solitude, spiritual reflection and the growth of our inner life? Do we remind ourselves each day of our connections with people, other creatures and all that sustains life? Are we ready to live in the Spirit that heals estrangements that may arise from resentment, nagging fears, and alienation from others? CAROL FRENCH DOUGHTY (1963-2009)

Carol Doughty, 45, died in Helsingborg Sweden, May 14th, when her struggle with cancer ceased. The daughter of Polly



and Paul Doughty and sister of Tom, Carol was a member of our Meeting since childhood. She worked in the field of primary education, which she loved. She also was a mentor teacher in bi-lingual education specializing in teaching kindergarten and first grade pupils. She was a peer elected representative to the United Teachers of LA County union. She was married in Sweden to Bo Nilsson, where Carol worked in education and Bo in industrial chemistry. Her daughter Maya was born in 2002. All knew her as a caring, creative and enthusiastic person. Her friends and family love and miss her greatly.

The family started two Memorials to commemorate her dedication to education and to sustain her strong belief that teaching was an indispensable calling in support of society and nation: The *Carol French Doughty Memorial Scholarship* at the Alachua County Public Schools Foundation, Inc at 1725 S. E. 1st Avenue, Gainesville 32641, to support needy students at GHS in pursuing careers in teaching and enrolling at Santa Fe College; The *Carol French Doughty Memorial Fund*

at the Center for Latin american Studies, 319 Grinter Hall, University of Florida, Gainesville 32611; to support graduate students working on Latin american and Latino issues pursuing careers in education.

Her memorial service in Gainesville will be held at the Meetinghouse on Saturday August 1st from 3-4 p.m. with a half hour musical prelude before and refreshments afterwards.

Around the Meetinghouse ♦ Jean Larson ♦ July 20, 2009

Since I recently returned from a trip to the Czech Republic and Poland, I am able to share my pleasure that learning Latin names for plants has side benefits. Bill and I visited a botanical garden in Prague where all the informational signs were in Czech but the tags associated with plants gave both the common and Latin names. We saw species familiar from Florida like the Soft rush or Juncus ffusus which is no longer present in the back retention pond, and species related to ones on the property like a member of the hophornbeam family (Ostrya) in bloom in the botanical garden which was different from the Ostrya virginiana on our property but had similar blooms.

It was very reassuring to see that Marylynn's redbud (watered in my absence by Jim Morrison) was looking healthy and that the lawn had been cut by Doug Butler. Indeed, all the plants that had been added in recent months were looking very happy at the plentiful rainfall, even if I had to look between the leaves of the some of the other plants that had sprouted so healthily in the meantime. The sandhill blackeyed susan (Rudbeckia mollis) is blooming if you look closely enough on the west side of the back retention basin and the loblolly bay (Gordonia lasianthus) nearby with its surround ferns is blooming very nicely.

John Burton was kind enough to show us mosquito larvae in different stages of development in the water atop a composting barrel left out near our new meeting for worship in nature area. While we were pleased to see the evidence of their growth in person, Bill tipped the barrel over to toss out the water and the habitat conducive to the growth of more mosquitoes. John also pointed out that our back retention pond appears to be retaining water, i.e. is also a habitat for mosquitoes, so Bill and I are monitoring the situation.



A walk around the property on Saturday showed bronze tree frogs in the hibiscus, whose flowers were such a show last month. Monarch butterfly caterpillars were munching on only a few remaining leaves among the butterfly milkweed that grew back from those planted the year before from plants Gary Arthur grew from seed. We were not successful hatching any monarchs last year, but the plants leafted out and had seeds after being stripped. We look to repeat this cycle this year, so I am thinking that a large plot of milkweed would be desirable for next year.

Near the back door to the meeting for worship room, there is a passion vine from the plants donated by Claudia Larsen two years ago. The gulf fritillary butterfly has laid eggs that hatched on this vine. The passion

vine by the backdoor is in the shade, but seeing a call for more, we planted one along the split rail fence that is in a sunnier spot. This passion vine was eaten down without our spotting the caterpillars involved, but last year both Zebra longwing and Gulf fritillary caterpillars were spotted on the leaves. Bill not only photographed the caterpillars of the Gulf fritillary, but also the butterfly.





We were cited for not having a permit for our sign by the code enforcement division of the City of Gainesville. The timing of the notice was not optimal, coming in the summer when Bill and I and Jean and David Chalmers were traveling. David consulted with Bud Brennan and found that no cement had been poured, so he was confident it could be moved without great difficulty. On Friday, he called a number of people together to move the sign onto the meeting house property. Paul Doughty selected the new location by the south side of the driveway at the east end of our property. I was not there for the actually process, but David reported that Doug



Butler and a friend were the ones most responsible for installing the sign in its new location. Jean Chalmers finally made contact with someone in the City of Gainesville who was able to respond to our desire to have a permit that makes our sign legitimate, and now, after the payment of a suitable fee, we are legal. Everyone who helped, even if only by cheering, has my gratitude.
