The Peace & Social Concerns Committee will meet on Sunday, October 25 at 9:40am.

We will have a **Forum** on Sunday, October 4, at 12:45 on the painful and disturbing question of the use of torture as a part of our so-called war on terrorism. We will show excerpts from the recent documentary, "Torturing Democracy." Although it does not show all the graphic details of torture, this is a deeply shocking and disturbing film. We hope that seeing it will keep our awareness alive of what goes on out of our sight, unseen and unwitnessed, and encourage all of us to think about what we need to do to re-build a society that does not want or accept torture. There are some parts of reality that most of us would prefer not to see and to ignore entirely, but torture is too violent and evil to pretend that it has not been an important part of our public policy—or that it has not affected our lives. For those with children we will arrange childcare during the film. Volunteers who may not wish to see the film are welcome to help with the children.

American policy on torture has been one of the major concerns of the FCNL. Here is a brief section from their recent bulletin of April 12, 2009: "In response to the release of the torture memos, FCNL calls for a "Commission of Inquiry". We believe it is the United States' moral obligation to investigate the authorization and use of torture by U.S. government agents in our name. Note: The Hippodrome will be showing FOOD.INC from September 21-October 1. This is an important and revealing documentary about our increasingly industrialized food industry and its consequences for our personal health and for the health of farm workers, the economy and society. We will plan a Forum in the near future about the grass roots slow food movement and other related efforts. *Jim Morrison*

We will show Frozen River (2008), a moving film about two desperately poor single mothers who, as a last resort to survive, embark on an illegal venture transporting immigrants into the US across Mohawk territory. ...A gripping and moving film. Around the Meetinghouse & Jean Larson & September 21, 2009

The goldenrod in the children's yard is blooming, and it reminds me that I should be out pulling up more ragweed, since it blooms around the same time. On my walk through the woods yesterday with Bill and Brad, I noticed some healthy specimens in the area just south of the split rail fence, but there is much less than last year at this time. Especially pleasing is to look at the slope west of the front retention pond which was heavily infested last year and where Bill has been scything it away. Now there are lots of Bidens alba, variously know as common beggarticks, shepherd's needles, Spanish needles, the butterfly needles. In their butterfly book, Marc and Maria Minno note that butterflies are attracted to the flowers of this plant which reliably blooms over a long period. It is the bane of those wearing nice silk shirts in which the barbed seeds lodge so readily.

Speaking of butterflies, I visited the area behind the meetinghouse prior to meeting and was rewarded with the sight of two Monarch butterflies visiting the yellow tropical butterfly milkweed that was started from seed by Gary Arthur. It is a real pleasure to see the butterflies around the meeting lot, flying down the driveway, visiting flowers we have planted and that have arrived on their own

While behind the meetinghouse, after deadheading Bud's rosebush, I also spotted a lovely yellow flower on a plant with which I was not familiar. Later I showed it to Brad, who listed the core data for the plant: 4 yellow petals, 4 sepals, 8 stamens, 1 pistil, alternate leaves, hairy stem, hairy slender leaves, pointed at each end with smooth edges, and a thick area below the plane of the petals where the seeds would develop. At home I flipped through Walter Kingsley Taylor's Guide to Florida Wildflowers, and picked out what he calls Primrose Willow (Ludwigia peruviana) and noted the resemblance to Ludwigia octovalvis. I knew there are Florida native Ludwigias, because we have one growing in the back retention pond. Then I looked up Ludwigia in the Florida Atlas of Vascular Plants online. There are lots of different kinds of Ludwigia in Florida, and I was having trouble telling them apart from the photographs, so I checked out Richard Wunderlin's Guide to the Vascular Plants of Florida, which is basically a gigantic key with no pictures or drawings, and only brief indications of location, and whether or not the plant is common. The specimen clearly keyed out to Ludwigia peruviana, which I was dismayed to see is listed among the category 1 invasive species with air potatos, Japanese climbing fern, and coral ardisia, all of which we are trying to eradicate from our natural area.



Also blooming at this time is the firebush planted by Tracy Jeshow near the tall stump now covered with vines by the front parking lot. There are lovely purple heads of Mistflower, also known as Ageratum (Conoclinium

coelestinum) blooming on the west side of the front retention basin, and across the basin, one sees the bright red berries of the hearts a'busting with love.

Beautyberries have their bright purple berries out at this time. Out by the back retention basin, the yellow tops (Flaveria linearis) are nearly spent, and the Chamaecrista fasculata is putting out beans. It is a pleasure to walk through the woods, looking at the record of the recent rains carved in ripples in the sand where the water floods through, and enjoying the flit of the birds and the butterflies though the woods.
