MUTUAL CARE

Query: How do we foster a spirit of community among the Meeting's members and attenders? How does the Meeting keep in contact with all of the Meeting's members and attenders? How does the Meeting assist couples and families to communicate, grow together, and rear children in a loving environment? Does the Meeting Community nurture the Meeting's children? How does the Meeting care for those who live alone, the sick, the aging, the widowed, the separated or divorced, and others with families affected by disruption? Do we assist Friends in need as their circumstances require? How do we labor with and care for those whose conduct or manner of living give grounds for concern? How are visitors to our Meeting made to feel welcome?

Advice: Be truthful and sincere and thus encourage these qualities in others. Through example and education, help each other to recognize and follow the voice of God both in our spiritual lives and in joyful and willing service. Watch with tenderness over the opening minds of children. Seek to awaken in them the love and understanding of the life and teachings of Jesus, and a sense of security in the love of God. Remember that there is a unique potential in each human being as a beloved child of God, and the Holy Spirit may lead children to give wise counsel to listening adults. Young people, too, have responsibility to care for the Meeting and to participate in Meetings both for Worship and for Business. Faith is needed as a vital part of our living.

The committee chose this topic based on the comments and questions raised in the forum held to help our clerk write "The Spiritual State on the Meeting" on Sunday, January 2.

On Sunday, November 6 the committee will present a forum discussion on "Quaker Quest." We will explain what it is, and what the meeting would need to do to implement it. Quaker Quest is both a process and an experience. At the forum we will discuss whether the meeting would like a workshop to help us discern what changes we might want to make to help newcomers integrate into the life of the meeting, and if we feel led to undertake public sessions about Quakerism.

Go about .6 miles to Wilder Ct. (2nd rd) take right, it is an unpaved rd. Dead ends into our easement – curve left then right by "No Trespassing" - keep going straight onto grass driveway, do not go to trailers on left. See reflectors. It is about an hour from Gainesville. 
blossoms.

The hophorn beam flowers that I had seen in bud and expected to be blooming at this time have, instead, disappeared presumably swept away in one of the recent storms that brought much need water. The grassy parking bay by the back retention pond is filled with violets and lyreleaf sage. Just inside the woods the green dragons are coming up.

I walked through the woods on March 14 and wandered down the creek. I was surprised that it didn't turn south to the big sink just east of the apartment buildings,

instead all of it tumbled down the hill heading toward our pond area. As I followed the creek bed, I noticed a fork of it heading in a new direction and found a new swampy place. One of the wonderful things about a floodplain





On the way to the pond, which had standing water reflecting the greenery around it, Bill pointed out the Florida Yam putting out new leaves. It is from the same genus, Discorea (yam), as the air potato. When I walked up from the pond

along the west side of the front retention basin I spotted a flower on the red buckeye that had been planted the previous year and had dropped its leaves so early in the fall drought that I had not hoped to see it sprouting anew. Across the parking lot I spotted the coreopsis in front of the meetinghouse. It is good to see friends showing of their finery again.
